Forklift Safety Equipment - There are several industries and operations, for instance agricultural, manufacturing and warehousing that make use of powered industrial trucks including lift trucks or forklift trucks on a regular basis within the place of work. Forklift trucks are used to be able to raise or lower items or transfer things that are stored in containers or on pallets to other areas in the workplace. These industrial equipment assist to enhance productivity at the jobsite by reducing the need for excessive physical handling of things by staff. According to the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, there are roughly twenty thousand severe injuries each year in America and approximately one hundred fatalities caused by forklift incidents.

Every different lift truck or forklift consists of different load capacities. Where a load is concerned, each and every unit would differ for particular maximum weight and forward center gravity. Injuries for workers frequently happen from falls from the forklift, forklift overturn, crushing incidents or falls from the forklift. Operator falls can happen as the employee descends or ascends into the driver cab or becomes ejected from the machine in the event of an incident or a collision. Lift trucks could overturn because of having an unequal center of gravity of the cargo, or from being over-loaded or traveling over an uneven surface which can cause the vehicle to topple over. It is vital for other co-workers to observe strict preventive measures when working next to the lift truck. Without ample preventive measures, pedestrian co-workers are at risk from collisions or accidents associated with an unsafe load.

In relation to forklift operation, training and maintenance, there are strict training and standards to be followed. Like for instance, people who are under 18 years old and are in non-agricultural industries are allowable not to work a forklift truck. It is necessary that all lift truck operators should have undergone both theoretical and practical training previous to commencing forklift operation and they are even needed to take refresher courses.

The "American National Standard for Powered Industrial Trucks, ANSI B56.1-1969 are the standards which all powered industrial trucks need to comply with. The particular OSHA standards which employers as well as employees should adhere to as stated in the General Industry Standards include 1910.178 "Powered industrial trucks", and standards for Marine Terminals 29 CFR 1917 Subpart C, "Cargo handling gear and equipment" and Long shoring 29 CFR 1918 Subpart G, "Cargo handling gear and equipment other than ship's gear.

It is even essential for employers to aware of the various other regulations and directives. The OSHA and NIOSH regulations both outline for the employers and employees to all the regulations that apply.
